CAPTAIN GUSTAVUS CONYNGHAM

CONTINENTAL NAVY

Gustavus Conyngham, namesake of the **USS CONYNGHAM** (DDG 17), was born in County Donegal, Ireland 1744. He immigrated to the United States (Colonies) with his father a few years before the Revolutionary War and resided in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania.

In 1777, the merchant ship he commanded was seized and interned in Europe. He then sought and obtained a Captain's Commission in the Continental Navy. Operating primarily in British waters, Captain Conyngham proved to be one of the most successful and audacious naval officers in the American Revolution.

His first naval command was the 100 ton cutter **SURPRISE** whose mission was attacking British shipping in the English Channel. After taking numerous prizes he was given command of the cutter **REVENGE**, which was larger and faster than **SURPRISE**. He continued to harass British shipping, taking more than 60 prizes in 18 months. Each ship captured was sent into a friendly port and the cargo disposed of in the interest of the revolutionary cause. Historians indicate that the proceeds from these prizes contributed materially to the operations of Benjamin Franklin and his American mission in France.

British influence finally forced the closure of French and Spanish ports to him, so he set sail for the West Indies where he convoyed American shipping in addition to continuing his task of capturing enemy merchant ships.

In 1779, Captain Conyngham returned to Philadelphia, but on his next cruise he was captured and taken prisoner as a privateer. He was interned first in New York and then in London, from which he escaped only to be recaptured while returning to America in 1780. Again he escaped and was in France, preparing to cruise against the British, when the war ended.

Captain Conyngham returned to the merchant service and commanded the armed brig **MARIA** during the Quasi-War with France. Later, as a member of the common council of Philadelphia, he assisted in the defense of the city during the War of 1812. Captain Conyngham died on 27 March 1819 and is buried in St. Peter's churchyard in Philadelphia.

HISTORY OF THE USS CONYNGHAM DDG-17

USS CONYNGHAM (DDG 17) was built by the New York Shipbuilding Corporation, Camden, New Jersey. Her keel was laid 1 May 1961. The ship was launched 19 May 1962 and was commissioned on 13 July 1963.

USS CONYNGHAM is assigned to the Cruiser-Destroyer Force, U.S. Atlantic Fleet. She has conducted extensive operations in the Atlantic Ocean, the Mediterranean Sea and the Caribbean Sea in the pursuit of her mission of keeping the world's commercial sea lanes free and open to all nations. In this regard **CONYNGHAM** keeps herself ready to join the forces of other nations in maintaining the freedom of the seas. In 1973, **CONYNGHAM** was awarded the Battle Efficiency "E" Award in recognition of her superior overall Operational Readiness and Training. She also received awards for excellence in CIC (Operations), ASW Weapons and Operations "A" and the Missile "E". **CONYNGHAM** has previously won the Battle Efficiency Award in 1964, 1965, and 1969.

The men who serve aboard the **USS CONYNGHAM** come from all parts of the United States and represent all races, creeds, religions and ways of life found in our country. They come from the cities of the Northeast, the farms of the great American Midwest, the warm Southern coastal plain, the high Rocky Mountains, and the modern West Coast. The Mariana Islands, an American Territory, is represented as is the Philippine Islands, the United States' ally in the Western Pacific. There are white Americans of European descent, black Americans of African descent, and Mexican-Americans. All come aboard to do their part in the defense of their country and to help maintain peace and freedom throughout the world. They live and work together in harmony toward the common goal of keeping **CONYNGHAM** alert and ready. After their present tour of service is complete most will return to their homes and use their skills and talents in the civilian economy but some will remain in the Navy and will devote their efforts and lives, if necessary, toward the preservation of peace and freedom of the seas.



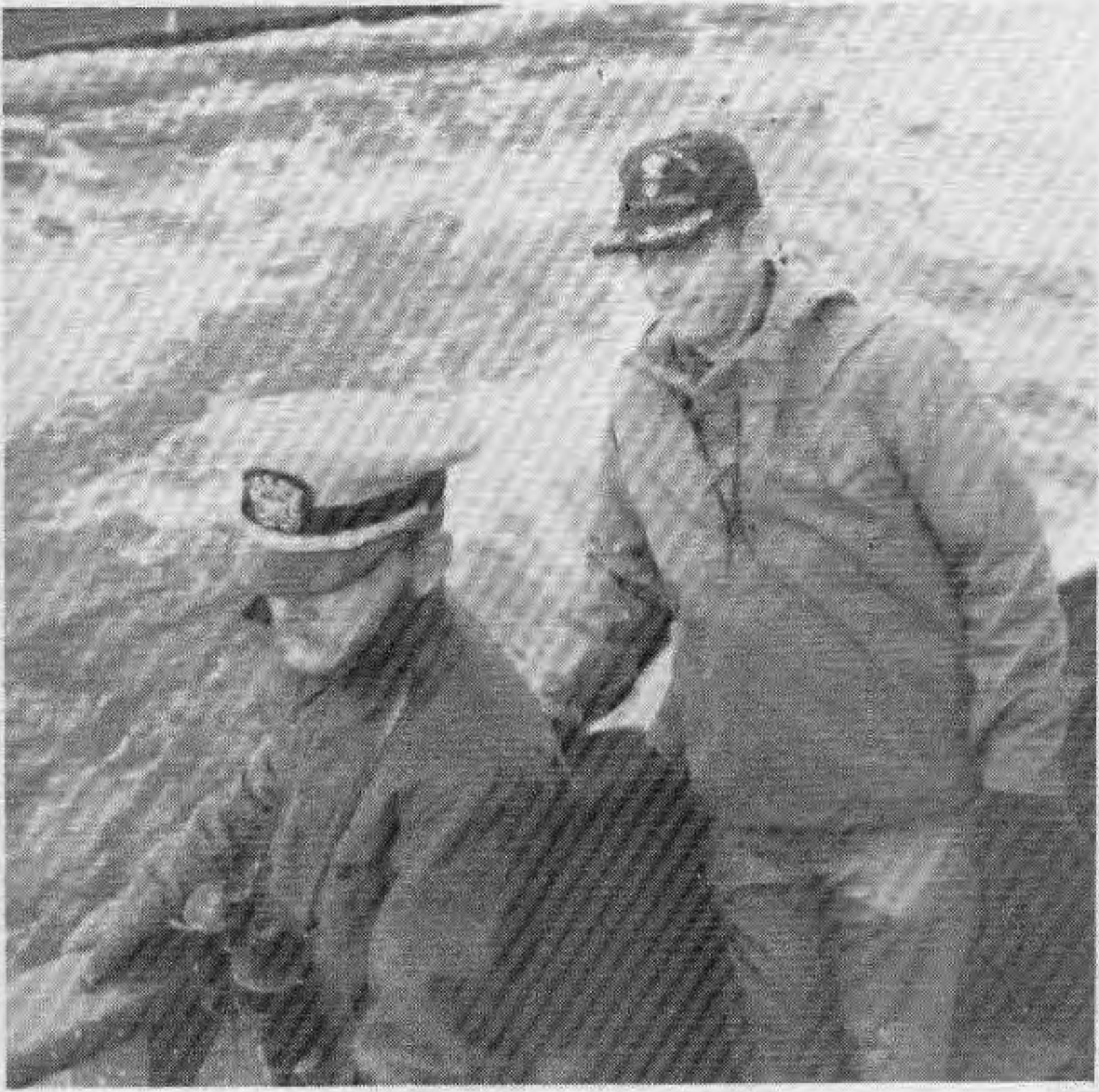
COMMANDER LLOYD W. FERNALD, Jr.

Commander Lloyd W. Fernald, Jr. entered the Naval Academy in 1953 from Rockland, Maine. Upon his graduation from Annapolis in 1957 he served as Boiler Officer in the **USS ROCHESTER** (CA-124). He then served four years on **USS SOMERS** (DD-947) as ASW and Gunnery Officer followed by a tour of duty in the Fleet Operations Branch of the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations, Washington, D.C.

Upon Completion of his tour in OPNAV, Commander Fernald reported as Executive Officer **USS LESTER** (DE-1022). This duty was followed by his assignment as Commanding Officer, **USS FIRM** (MSO-444). While in command of **FIRM**, during the period of DEC. 1966 to JUN. 1968 Commander Fernald participated in four Operation Market Time patrols off the coast of the Republic of Vietnam for which he was awarded the Navy Commendation Medal with Combat "V".

In June 1968, Commander Fernald reported to U.S. Naval Postgraduate School, Monterey. Receiving his Master of Science Degree in Personnel Management, Commander Fernald was assigned to the Bureau of Naval Personnel where he served as Surface Warfare Assistant in the Planning and Programming Branch of the Officer Distribution Division.

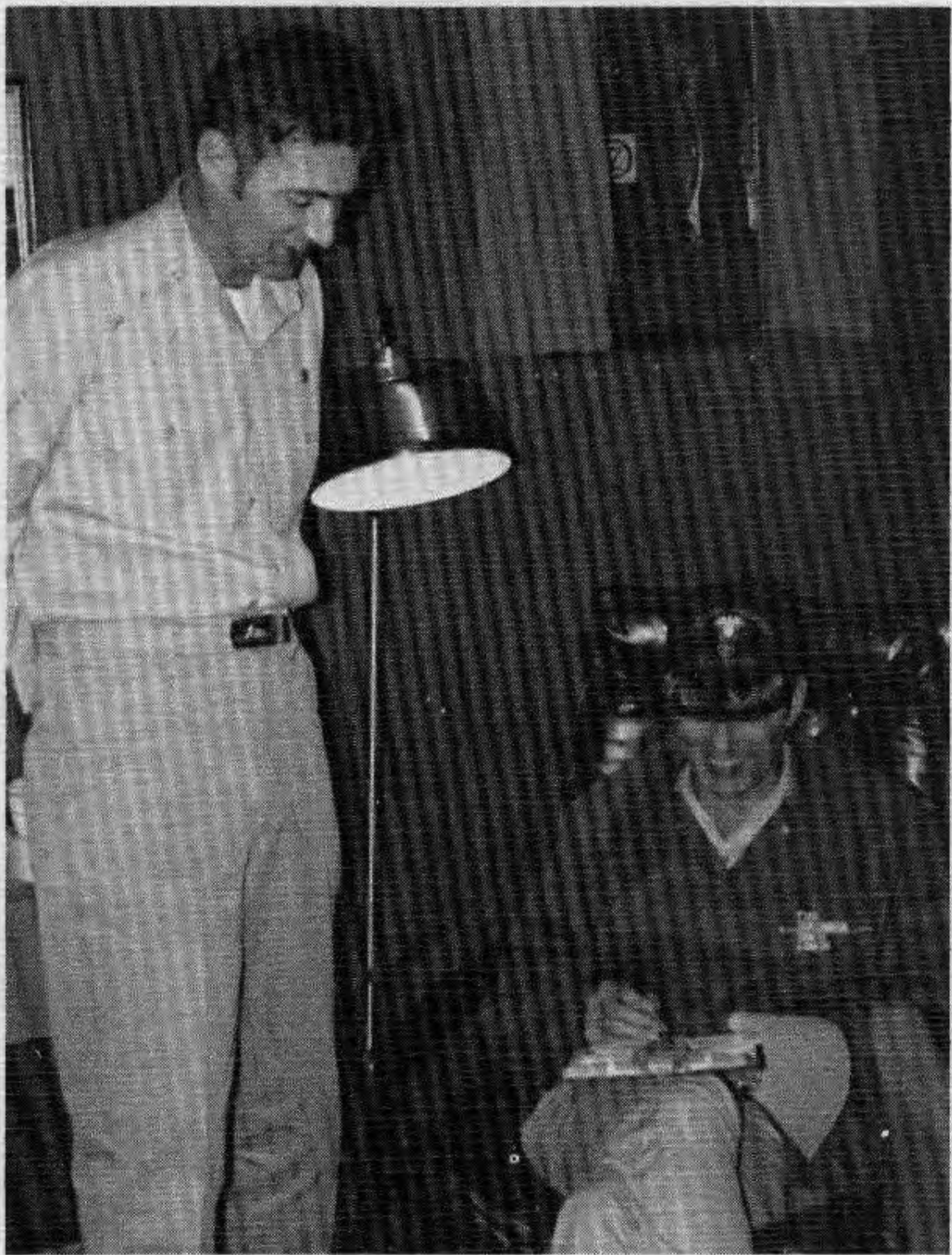

Commander Donald S. CAMPBELL, Jr., a native of Idaho, is a graduate of the Class of 1954, U.S. Naval Academy. Following graduation and commissioning he reported to the **USS JAMES E. KYES** (DD 787) where he served as Gunnery Officer prior to attending Submarine School in 1957.

In addition to the **USS KYES**, Commander CAMPBELL has served in the following afloat commands: Combat Information Officer in **USS SPINAX** (SSR 489); Engineer Officer in **USS VOLADOR** (SS 490); Weapons Officer in **USS PERCH** (APSS 313); Operations Officer in **USS GREENFISH** (SS 351); Executive Officer in **USS TANG** (SS 563) and as Commanding Officer of the Fast Attack Submarine **USS BARBEL** (SS 580). He reports to **CONYNGHAM** from **USS LEAHY** (DLG 16) where he served as Executive Officer.

His duties ashore have included assignment as Assistant Professor of Naval Science at the University of Idaho; Assistant Operations Officer on the Staff, Commander Submarine Force, U.S. Pacific Fleet; in the Operations and Plans section of the Submarine Warfare Division of the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations; and as the Washington Placement Officer in the Bureau of Naval Personnel.

Among the awards earned by Commander CAMPBELL are the Meritorious Service Medal and the Navy Commendation Medal with Gold Star for the Second Award. He has recently been selected for the rank of Captain.

He is married to the former Phyllis Jean OLSEN of Spokane, Washington. They have three children: daughters, Karen and Kimberly and son, Bradley, currently residing in Virginia Beach, Virginia.

UNITED STATES NAVY

Captain Ferdinand I. COLLINS, Jr., born in Somerville, New Jersey, entered the U.S. Naval Academy in June of 1950 and graduated in the Class of 1954. Immediately after commissioning he spent three months as an instructor at Annapolis before reporting to **USS K. D. BAILEY** (DDR 713) where he served as the Communications Officer until 1956. Following his initial tour, Captain COLLINS joined the staff of Commander Destroyer Division 142 as the Operations Officer until December of 1957 when he was assigned to **USS CANBERRA** (CAG 2) as the Combat Information Center Officer and Missile Officer.

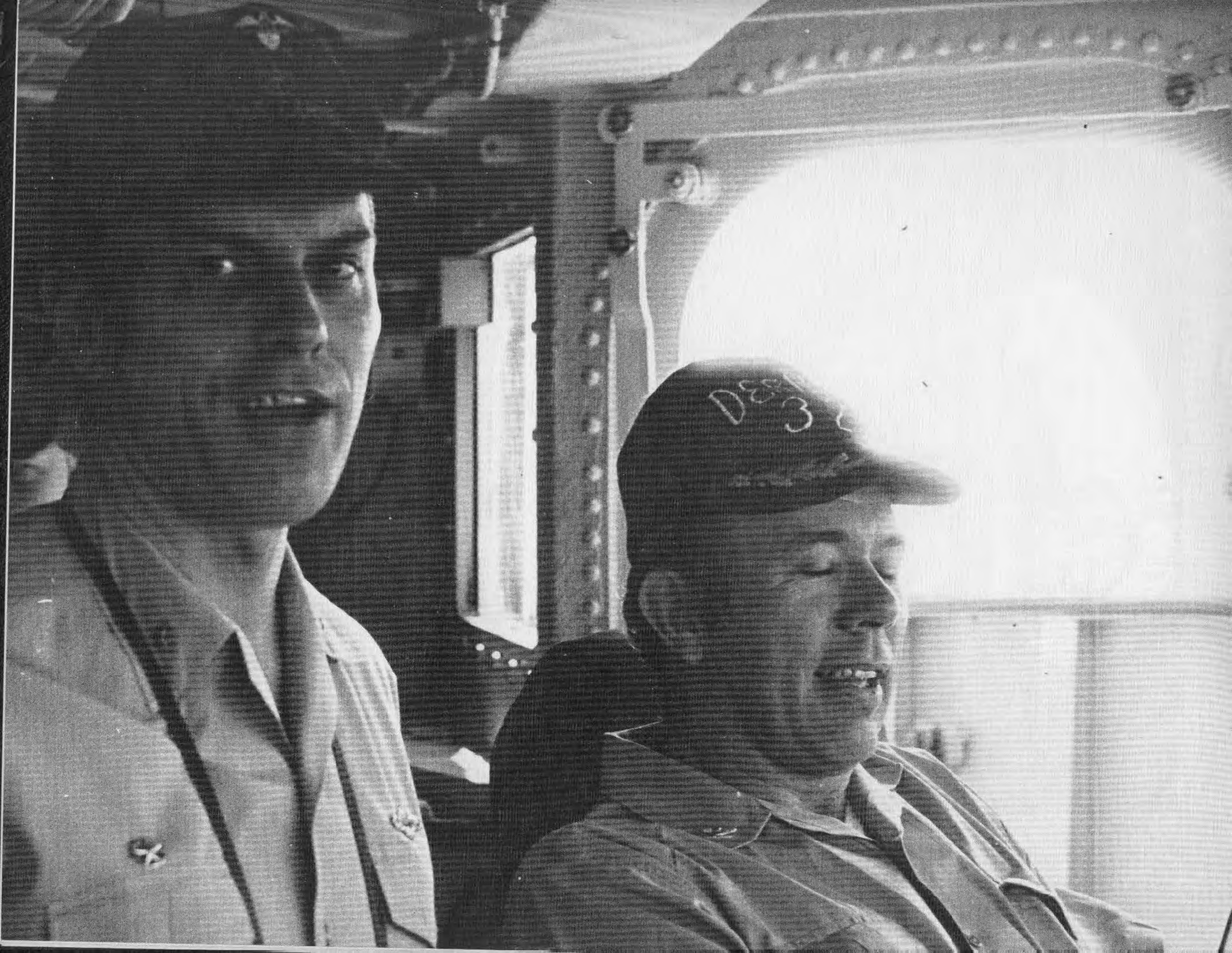
In June of 1959 he entered the U.S. Naval Postgraduate School in Monterey, California where he earned a Master of Science degree in Operational Research. Returning to sea in 1961, he served as Operations Officer in **USS MACDONOUGH** (DLG 8) for 13 months. He next attended the U.S. Naval Mine Warfare School, Charleston, South Carolina and upon completion in January, 1963 assumed command of **USS BULWARK** (MSO 435) until November, 1963.

Moving to Washington upon detachment from **BULWARK**, Captain COLLINS served as Assistant Chief, Special Studies and Objectives Division of the Office of Program Appraisal, Department of the Navy until the summer of 1966. He then returned to duty in destroyers as Executive Officer, **USS DAHLGREN** (DLG 12) before being reassigned to Washington in October 1967 as the Assistant for Plans, Programs and Budget Division (OP-970C) of the Office of the Chief of Naval Operations. In September of 1969, Captain COLLINS was appointed as the Military Assistant to the Assistant to the Secretary and Deputy Secretary of Defense, the position in which he served until his current assignment as Commander Destroyer Squadron THIRTY-TWO.

Among the awards earned by Captain COLLINS are the Distinguished Service Medal, the Joint Service Commendation Medal, the Navy Commendation Medal. He is also a member of the Scientific Research Honor Society SIGMA XI. He was promoted to Captain in July 1972.

Captain COLLINS is married to the former Marcie S. KENNY of Chappaqua, New York. They have three children, two sons, ages 8 and 6, and a daughter, age 4.
